The Chronology Begins The Early Years in the U.S.

- **1727**
 - The "Junto" established by Benjamin Franklin
- **1826**
 - First Lyceum organized by Josiah Holbrook
- **1833**
 - First public library in Peterborough, NH



The Chronology Goes On - Entering Manufacturing Era

- **1834**
 - Founding of the first evening school, Louisville, KY
- **1862**
 - The Land Grant Act establishing state colleges and universities
- **1874**
 - Founding of the Chautauqua Institution,
 Chautauqua, NY



The 20th Century Brings Many Adult Education Opportunities

- **1912**
 - The Smith-Lever Act sets up Cooperative
 Extension Service initially just for adults
- **1924**
 - National Education Association creates the Department of Adult Education
- **1926**
 - American Association of Adult Education organized



The Shaping of the Modern ERA – the 1928-1950

1928

 Thorndike publishes adult learn. research Lindeman publishes *Meaning of Adult Educ*.

■ 1930s

 Americanization movement caps off its education of millions of immigrants

■ 1940s

 The G. I. Bill enables millions of veterans to obtain a college education



Adult Education Momentum in the 1950s

1951

 Fund for Adult Education set up by the Ford Foundation

1951

Adult Education Association of the U.S.A established

1952

 National Association of Public School Adult Educators established



The Federal Government's Enhancing Role in the 1960s

- 1964
 - The Economic Opportunity Act provides funds for Adult Basic Education
- **1965**
 - The Higher Education Act provides funds for community service activities
- **1966**
 - The federal Adult Education Act



1970s:

- Graduate programs in adult education expand across the country (and world)
- 1972-74
 - The National Adult Education Think Tank Project
- **1976**
 - The Lifelong Learning Amendment



- International Adult and Continuing Education Hall of Fame
- Literature and research in adult education expands tremendously
- Adult education evolves through relationships with other disciplines
- Literacy efforts continually increase
 (<u>ProLiteracy</u> headquarters in Syracuse)
- International Society for Self-Directed
 Learning with its journal
