I consider my thirteen years as your Minister of Religious Education as some of my most enjoyable and memorable. My seven years as Nick Cardell's colleague were fun, energizing, filled with my own growth as a minister within a congregation where this was all supported and encouraged. During my time in Syracuse I branched out into the wider community, especially through my work with the Planned Parenthood affiliate and Peace Child. I was supported in this work by the congregation who

understood this as part of ministry to the community as well as being part of my ministry to the congregation. My work on the Meadville Lombard Theological School Board and Modified Residency Committee were also seen as part of my ministry to both communities, and proudly supported as well.

I was especially gratified when you all chose to change the name of May Memorial to be inclusive of my faith tradition, Universalism. It was an affirmation of the future of our faith as a "head and heart" religion. And we did have heart!! I shall always remember with great exhilaration our productions of Yanamamo and the incredible work done by so many in the congregation to bring them off with such success. We did have our fun times in RE and that is a major part of building a community for all ages and to the creating of May Memorial as an educating congregation. My interactions with members in the Building Your Own Theology courses, the Bill Moyers programs, and the World Religion seminars with local faith leaders developed mutual faith journeys for all of us, and built a stronger commitment to Unitarian Universalism, May Memorial, and to one another.

We had our tough times as well, but we stayed in community together and came through them with bumps and scratches, but together nonetheless. And we learned how not to do things, and slowly, from that, how to do them better.
